



Information from the Truancy Officer

Welcome to 2018 all students and families. My Office wishes you all well and to have a grand second semester.

Please know that I will be conducting Truancy Diversion Project (TDP) 3 times this month. If you, the parent, receive a letter from me, please make every attempt to attend the meeting. A lot of information about your child will be discussed, and you as the parent need and should be present for it all.

I would like to have EVERY parent refer to the Student Handbook in regards to the Attendance Policy of your child at Santee Community School. Many changes occurred this past year, that I am not sure you are fully aware of. The handbook is available on the Santee Community School website and/or a hard copy can be obtained at the front desk of the school if you didn't receive one at the beginning of the school year. Please contact me at the number listed below if you should have any questions about the Santee Sioux Nation's Compulsory Education Law and/or the State of Nebraska's Compulsory Education Statute/Law.

Lastly, I would like to remind ALL STUDENTS and PARENTS that the Santee Community School under the Nebraska State Statute/Law under Compulsory Education, does NOT recognize EXCUSED absences anymore, for any reason. "An absence is an absence", therefore I recommend that ALL parents keep the lines of communication open with ME and the school on behalf of your child/children and their whereabouts. Please call the school and/or me at the school in regards to your child's attendance. ONLY the Truancy Officer can excuse absences for Medical, Dental, Vision Appointments and/or Hospitalizations, to include Funeral Leave for IMMEDIATE Family members only. Any absence outside of those standards is considered UNEXCUSED, and will be prosecuted through Tribal Court once the child has accumulated 10 or more days of UNEXCUSED Absence. Please know that this is not a threat, but a reality, supported by the Santee Sioux Nation and other Tribal Programs, to get your child through the educational process in hopes to become a responsible adult. I will do all in my power to help you get through this, but I need your full cooperation and participation in Truancy Diversion if you should be called upon.

Let's ALL start the New Year off on a good note, in the right way, and work together to get your child/children to school ON TIME and present ALL DAY every day school is in session.

Music Notes: Back in the practice room again!



Elementary Principal Corner

The school year is flying by. It is hard to believe the second semester is here. As we look ahead to the New Year resolutions, make some goals with your student(s) about their learning and future plans. Please visit with your student about the best part of their learning each day. This is one of the best things you can do at home to support your student's learning growth. Just simple questions for example:

What was the best part of the day today?

What questions did you ask about your subjects?

What was something new you learned today?

What did you practice with success?

Conversations about learning is being emphasized in many of our classroom by journaling, exit tickets, "What did I learn" charts, A/B partners sharing learning, and even stating one thing they did well that day after school.

MAPS Testing will be the second week of January. Please make sure students are in school. These tests give us a "mid –year snapshot" as where we are as a school in growth of student achievement. Teachers use this information for student grouping and lesson planning going forward. Please take time to ask your student(s) about their RIT scores and their growth goals.

<u>Talking</u> is more powerful than listening



- The person doing the most talking during a lesson is doing the most learning.
- We need to create more learning opportunities for pupils to talk and <u>listen</u> to each other
- We talk so we can remember, process and understand.

Ways to Support Learning at Home

Take Attendance Seriously

Sick kids should stay home from school if they have a fever, are nauseated, vomiting, or have diarrhea. Kids who lose their appetite, are clingy or lethargic, complain of pain, or who just don't seem to be acting "themselves" should also take a sick day.

Otherwise, it's important that kids arrive at school on time every day, because having to catch up with class work and homework can be stressful and interfere with learning.

If your child is missing a lot of school due to illness, make sure to check with the teacher about any work that needs to be completed. It's also a good idea to know the school's attendance policy.

Sometimes students want to stay home from school because of problems with classmates, assignments or grades, or even teachers. This can result in real symptoms, like headaches or stomachaches. If you think there's a problem at school, talk with your child — and then perhaps with the teacher — to find out more about what's causing the anxiety. The school counselor or school psychologist also might be able to help.

Also try to avoid late bedtimes, which can result in tardy and tired students. A consistent sleep schedule can help.

Make Time to Talk About School

It's usually easy to talk with elementary students about what's going on in class and the latest news at school. You probably know what books your child is reading and are familiar with the math being worked on. But parents can get busy and forget to ask the simple questions, which can have an effect on children's success at school.

Make time to talk with your child every day, so he or she knows that what goes on at school is important to you. When kids know parents are interested in their academic lives, they'll take school seriously as well.

Because communication is a two-way street, the way you talk and listen to your child can influence how well your child listens and responds. It's important to listen carefully, make eye contact, and avoid multitasking while you chat. Be sure to ask questions that go beyond "yes" or "no" answers.

Besides during family meals, good times to talk include car trips (though eye contact isn't needed here, of course), walking the dog, preparing meals, or standing in line at a store.

These early years of schooling are an important time for parents to be informed and supportive about their child's education.



We are off to a great start in 2018! The students are excited to be writing their assignments in cursive. We learned all the letters and practiced words before break. Our focus is on sentences and figuring out how to connect all those letters.

Mrs. Nagel provided the beef from her herd, a dehydrator, spices and a extruder. Mrs. Flying hawk also provided a dehydrator and from the school. The cooks from the kitchen lent us the bowls and spoons to mix in the spices.

Things we learned from in Ag Class while making jerky

The extruder works best when:

- 1. meat pack in cylinder with no air pockets
- 2. flat opening of the tip is in straight line with the trigger
- 3. When applying the pressure to the trigger the speed of the movement across the rack effects the shape and thickness of the jerky ribbon
 - A. If you move fast the meat ribbon brakes
 - B. If you move slow the meat ribbon brakes

About the dehydrator.

- 1. Can put the jerky close together because it will shrink.
- 2. The jerky will sink about 40%
- 3. Most be checked every 4 hours
- 4. Need to rotate the trays for even drying.
- 5. To kill the food pathogens a temperature of 130oF most be reached

About the meats:

- 1. Beef is easier to chew more tender
- 2. Beef has more fat
- 3. Beef is Greasier.
- 4. Deer has more flavor

About taking surveys:

- 1. The customer is always right

 - C. Not everyone likes jerky
